









Younger and older neighbours - comparison to polling






Older neighbours - by living situation






Older neighbours - frequency of interaction









Older Neighbours - Ioneliness score by intensity of interaction

Less frequently than once a month (n=38)	3.63




Comparison of older and younger neighbours




Older and younger neighbours - frequency of interactions
